LETTER FROM THE BOARD ...

As 2011 draws to a close, the Board of Echo Hill Campership Fund thanks you for your generosity in what has undoubtedly been a difficult economic year. Your willingness to support us, when every dollar means more than ever, is a testament to your belief in the positive impact Echo Hill camp has on a child living in poverty.

As our loyal readers know, EHCF has grown organically since its inception 25 years ago. Initially working with a small group of donors, the founding board members plowed a path, unsure of what would follow. Working first with one Campership kid, then a handful, they realized their dream was achievable: An organization that would sponsor children-in-need at camp, year after year.

While their immediate need was to raise funds to sponsor children, their larger goal was to create a quasi-alumni association to broadcast the mission. But branding the organization while targeting potential donors was hard and progress seemed slow.

Truth is, it would have been easy to stop and quit at any time.

As current board members, we look back on our founders with great respect. No matter the obstacle we encounter or the difficulty in achieving our current vision of growth, we know our predecessors had it harder. They never stopped just because it was difficult.

Everyone who has ever been touched by this non-profit's work owes them a debt of gratitude. We tip our hats and thank them for the spirit, vision, judgement, and ultimately, the perseverance they demonstrated.

These last three years at EHCF have not been easy. The hard facts: number of donors, down; amount of individual donations, down; and, number of applicants, way up.

Please read some of the children's letters of recommendation in the article: Pick One -- because essentially that's what we must do.

All of our applicants are worthy. Each has a wonderful and difficult story to tell. Each

ECHO HILL OUTDOOR SCHOOL - 40 YEARS OLD!

The Echo Hill Outdoor School is turning 40! It's hard to believe that the Outdoor School, offering outdoor education to students on the Echo Hill campus, started almost four decades ago. Peter Rice fondly recalled one of the earliest groups of students: "One of the first schools to attend in 1972 was a 6th grade class from inner city Philadelphia. At the time, the staff consisted of 15 Echo Hill counselors who agreed to come two weeks early. They were paid eight dollars per week plus room, board and fluff dry laundry. The real rewards, however, came when it was time for the students to go home. The tears and hugs and the fact that several children ran and hid because they wanted to stay, made it an unforgettable experience. We were all hooked."

This was the genesis of Echo Hill Outdoor School, now recognized as one of the pioneers in outdoor education. From its modest beginnings, the school has grown to serve students from over 150 schools from five-mid-Atlantic states and Washington, D.C. Last year alone, more than 5,500 students and adults learned about conservation, ecology, and history in classes held in the great outdoors; forest, farm, swamp and pond, in town and on local waterways. Over 100,000 students have attended the school since its inception.

Echo Hill Camp and Outdoor School have always maintained a close relationship, likely emanating from their common histories. At one point the two organizations shared facilities, staffs, and even boats! Who can forget the famous overnight trips on the Spirit - the classic Chesapeake Bay workboat owned and maintained by Echo Hill Outdoor School!

Now an enduring and well respected leader in the field of environmental education, Echo Hill Outdoor School will mark its 40th birthday in 2012 with appropriate celebration. 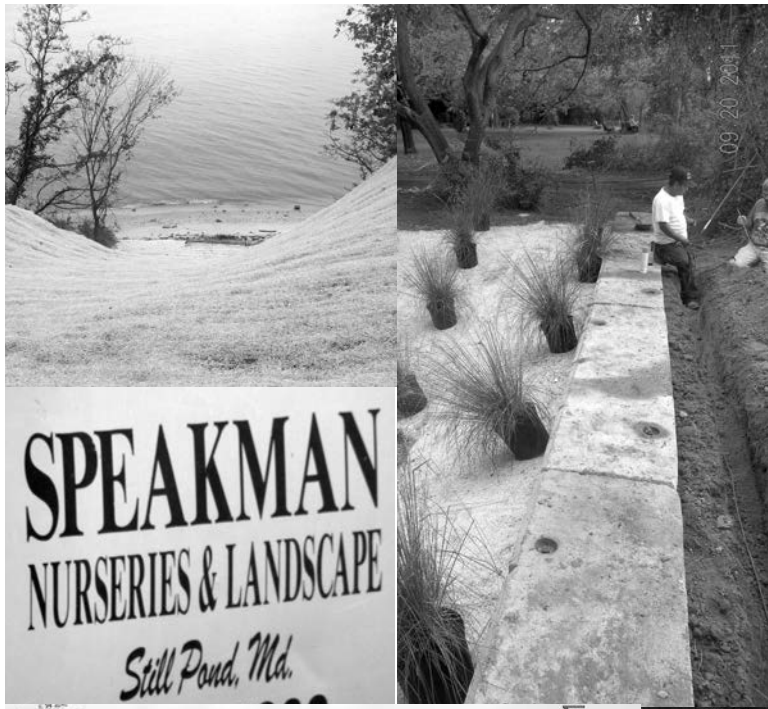


SLIP SLIDING AWAY ...

Her friendliness extends to the other children in the house whom she includes in her activities. However, her bubbly spirit is not just reserved for children. She readily joins in conversation with the adults at our house. She is also willing and happy to help. I believe her ease with others and helpful attitude partly comes from living in a large loving family.

Or

I am pleased to recommend <Mr. Applicant> for admission into your program. I have had the pleasure of teaching <Mr. Applicant> for two years and find him a qualified candidate.

As an educator I have observed both academic and social

growth in <Mr. Applicant>. Socially, he participates in many different programs throughout the year, working on political campaigns and helping around his neighborhood. I have noticed that he has gained immense confidence and ability to stand in front of crowds to deliver a well-written and thought-provoking speech. Behind the scenes at ehcf ...

Ever wonder what the EHCF does? As the newest member of the board (almost three years now), I'm still in awe of what it takes to send our kids to camp. A lot of what we do is fundraising, but there's so much more...

Our annual cycle begins in the autumn with a fund drive. The board meets once a month to discuss strategies, the newsletter and plans for the coming year. Mid-winter, after the newsletter push for funds, we figure out how many camperships we can afford, based on your donations. First we count how many weeks our returning kids need. We ask if they want to come back (invariably, "YES!"), how many two-week campers want to extend their stays to four weeks (we all know once you spend two weeks at Echo Hill, you want to stay the whole summer), and deduct the campers "aging out." Once these weeks are funded, we see how many new two-week camperships we can afford.

Then comes the hard part, choosing who gets to go. Look at the recommendations in "Pick One." All the children are deserving. How would you choose one over another? Luckily for the board members, we don't have to. The Selection

Committee does it for us. Imagine the mystique of Echo Ring (parents, ask your camper to explain). The committee meets independently, and much like The Firebirds, shoulders the responsibility.

But the board's work isn't over yet. We contact the accepted campers and their families to ensure they can get to camp (occasionally even offering rides to those who can not make it to Echo Hill on their own) and can obtain the long list of supplies needed. Imagine not having the resources for flashlights, duct tape and bug spray. The great part, though? Once these kids get to camp, it's hard to distinguish them from traditional campers. This is our ultimate goal. Obviously, it helps that most campers immediately shed their shoes when they get there and wear the same five sets of clothes. Echo Hill is one of the few places where dirty feet and ratty boxer shorts are trendy.

The work is worth it, though. The letters we receive after camp is over are testimony. More than one mentions camp's positive male role-models. All mention the amazing time that was had, and how much the campers want to return.

With your help, it is our pleasure to send them back!
